Mrs. Blust taught students what it was like going through the process of becoming a nurse. She recommended schools, classes to take, and what to go into based on what you feel is right for you. She also discussed what each type of nursing gets for their salary and how many years it takes for each level of nursing. Mrs. Blust chose to be a BSN which takes 4 years of schooling. Graduates with a BSN can work as bedside nurses in medical settings, such as hospitals, clinics, and physicians' offices. Mrs. Blust says the best part about her job would be helping her patients. She says her job is almost never boring because something new happens everyday and she gets to see new people with different problems who need her for help. It was very interesting to learn her story and why she chose this career.


